

FTA Administrators Visit OATS Transi



OATS Transit was pleased to host a visit by the Federal Transit Administration's newly appointed Region 7 Administrator, Carrie Butler, and Deputy Regional Administrator Mark Bechtel last month. It was an opportunity for Carrie to meet OATS Transit's Directors and learn more about our mission and the services we provide. FTA Region 7 consists of Missouri, Kansas, Iowa and Nebraska.



The time Carrie and Mark spent with OATS Transit staff was for sharing success stories and discussing challenges, including getting enough local funding to help with vehicle replacement, and expanding service where demand exceeds resources.

Funding from FTA is allocated to the State of Missouri, through the Missouri Department of Transportation, which then awards grants to eligible transit providers and monitors to assure the funds are being used efficiently and effectively. The FTA funds OATS Transit receives from MoDOT is for rural service and requires local funding to match those funds. When state and local governments, businesses, or residents contribute either financially or in-kind (such as volunteer labor or resources), they are signaling their commitment and support of local transportation services and underscores that the federal funds received have a meaningful impact.

Governor Outlines Budget Requests in State of State Address; Cuts Transit Funding

During his State of the State address on January 28, Governor Kehoe outlined his budget requests including a cut of \$5 million to state transit operating assistance. The SFY 2026 Missouri Highway and Transportation Commission request was \$11.7 million for Missouri transit. This request included \$10 million from General Revenue and \$1.7 million from the State Transportation Fund. This has been the funding level since 2023.

"It is a disappointment to see our wins for transit investment reduced in this year's budget recommendations from the Governor. This investment in transit is a critical match to ensure our providers can draw down the historic federal funding levels available for public transit back to Missouri. The price of doing business continues to escalate and this \$5 million is critical to continue to be able to deliver in Missouri," said Kimberly Cella, executive director of Missouri Public Transit Association. "This just means we will have to work even harder this year to educate the legislature on the importance of this investment to the state's bottom line."

As a recipient of state assistance funding, OATS Transit shares MPTA's concerns. "We use this funding as match

to federal grants which helps cover operating costs in rural areas" said Dorothy Yeager, Executive Director. "What makes this funding even more valuable has been its flexibility to use for operating or capital. The average local match required for a new vehicle is \$22,000. With new vehicles scheduled to come in next year, we hope to be able to utilize some of this funding to replace some of the older vehicles in our fleet that are long past their useful life. New vehicles actually helps reduce operating costs as they run more efficiently and don't require expensive repairs."

After a quick greeting and washing my hands, we found ourselves seated at the kitchen table, preparing several pints of pickles together. "A dear neighbor gifted us these cucumbers," Shirley said with a smile. "I love canning, and these will be great treats during the winter." We reminisced about the 'Good ol' days' as we put up the pickles and talked about gardening and how to stretch grocery resources

Living on a strict budget and ensuring all the bills are paid each month can be a challenge, even for the most frugal. The Strafford Senior Center is just around the corner from the Emersons' home, but getting there was a challenge for them after Phillip took a bad fall in their driveway several years ago, making him unable to drive and affecting his mobility. With their medical appointments sometimes being quite a driving distance, Shirley did not feel safe driving. It is a dilemma that faces many who live rurally and do not wish to inconvenience family members. So, the enterprising couple decided to find a way to safely get to their appointments. "We Googled it!" Shirley exclaimed with a giggle, as she pointed to a computer set up in the corner of the dining room, "And OATS Transit popped up, so we called!"

After sharing some more laughs about the use of technology, Shirley continued, "It's such a fantastic

service. Since we know when our appointments are, we can schedule a ride far out and the costs are affordable for us. Our driver, Don, always makes sure that we are safe. He helps me get to my appointments and takes extra time to make sure we get into the building safely."

Don Kiblinger has been a driver since 2010 and serves as a Team Leader for the Southwest Region. "We just love Don," Shirley said. "He teases us that the bus doesn't go anywhere until all the seatbelts are fastened. When we have someone on the bus who is in a wheelchair, he's always so careful that they are secure and safe. Don is always at the door to help us navigate the steps."

The Emersons mainly use OATS Transit's service for medical appointments and visits to the senior center but also understand that they can use it for grocery shopping. "It's easy to schedule a ride," Shirley says, adding, "I just call into the office and they help me get everything set up. Then comes Don just when we need him. OATS Transit has been a godsend to us. We feel independent and are able to get to our appointments without being a bother to the family. I'm so grateful for this service."

The pickles are finished, and I am entertained by the couple singing a few gospel songs. One of them was an original that Phillip had written. I asked him if he had ever recorded it, and he slyly grinned at me and said "Just Google it!"
